## STUDENTS TURN DRIVING INTO A DRINKING GAME

STANFORD, CA—Stanford students have always been at the forefront of new developments in every field, and the recent breakthroughs in drinking games have been no exception.

Luckily, Chief Justice John Roberts of the Supreme Court announced last week that the court will hold extra judicial review sessions to help students study for finals.


Despite Roberts' good intentions, his plans were not well received. Jeremiah Sweet, a Junior at American University explained, "This Judicial 'Review' Session is just


